EMERGENCY PLAN - APPENDIX M-1 ONTARIO SPCA GUIDELINES FOR PETS

Don't forget your pet! During an Emergency (2022 Version)

A. Pets and Emergencies

- 1. Pets are members of the family. Make sure to include your pets when developing your family emergency plan.
- 2. Making arrangements before an emergency will increase your pet's chances for survival and ability to cope.
- **3.** Assemble a pet emergency survival kit and be ready to take your pet and their kit with you in the event you have to evacuate.

B. Pet Emergency Survival Kit Checklist

- 1. Prepare a pet emergency survival kit and keep it with your family kit.
- 2. Be sure to check the expiry date of your contents twice a year.
- 3. Recommended items for dogs and cats:
 - Food, water, bowls, manual can opener and spoon
 - Up-to-date ID tag
 - Current photo of you and your pet
 - Emergency contact list of pet friendly hotels/motels outside your area, friends, relatives and your veterinarian
 - Copies of medical records/vaccinations
 - Information on feeding schedule, medical and/or behavioral problems
 - Medications and first aid kit
 - Familiar bedding, small toy and brush
 - Leash, collar or harness and muzzle (dogs)
 - Litter/pan and scooper (cats) or poop n' scoop bags (dogs)
 - Carrier large enough to transport and house your pet
- 4. Emergency kit supplies vary for different kinds of animals. Please contact your veterinarian or visit **www.ontariospca.ca** if you have any questions

C. Pets and Evacuations

- 1. If it's too dangerous for you to stay, it's too dangerous for your pet to stay.
- 2. If safety permits, pets should not be left behind during an evacuation as they may be lost, injured or even killed as a result of the emergency. Plan ahead to ensure that you have a safe place to take your pet.
- 3. Find out about your municipality's evacuation center locations and related pet policies.
- 4. Contact hotels and motels outside your immediate area and check their policy on accepting pets during an emergency.
- 5. Ask friends and relatives outside your immediate area if they could shelter your pet(s) during an emergency.
- 6. Include your pet in any local or family emergency drills and exercises.
- 7. If an emergency occurs when you are not at home, you can still be prepared. Set up a buddy system with your neighbor. Make arrangements that in the event of an emergency and you are not home they will take care of your pet.
