

Releasing public opinion surveys. Six surveys were distributed in 2021, generating a total of **1,402** responses!







#### 2021 YEAR IN REVIEW | COVID-19 RESPONSE

### VACCINE CLINICS HELD IN ASPHODEL-NORWOOD






A total of **2,486** doses of the COVID-19 vaccine were administered in Asphodel-Norwood.

Welcomed a new Public Works & Environmental Services Manager to the team

Responded to **37 winter events** over the 2020/2021 season

Produced approximately **11,000 cubic yards** of gravel

Collected approximately **139 tonnes** of leaf and yard waste


Maintained **133.7 km** of gravel roads, **18.2 km** of hard top roads, and **12 km** of sidewalks

### LOAD THE LOADER

Residents, members of Council, Township staff and firefighters came together on December 6, 2021 to donate much needed food and essential household items along with \$795 in support of the Asphodel-Norwood Ministerial Association Food Bank.

### GARBAGE COLLECTION

Overall, garbage collection was up 58 tonnes from 2020; most likely the result of the on-going pandemic with many families and seasonal residents staying at home the duration of the 2020/2021 winter season.



### **BY THE NUMBERS**



### LIGHTNING STRIKES

On September 15, 2021 the Wastewater Treatment Plant was affected by an electrical storm. The theory is that a power surge travelled through the ethernet network, affecting hardware in both the main office and the main treatment building. The primary Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) computer was lost, as well as network switches, programmable logic controller cards, radio equipment, and the distribution chlorine analyzer. Compliance was maintained however, thanks to SCADA system redundancies. Township staff have investigated risk mitigation strategies moving forward.

Total unplanned cost of the incident was \$29,588.32 (HST included).

### WELL NO. 4



The Township brought a fourth well online, adding a redundancy Well to the water system. In accordance with the Safe Drinking Water Act, the Township was granted a new Permit To Take Water (PTTW) on October 28, 2021.

### NEW ICE RESURFACER

The much anticipated new ice-resurfacer, the Olympia (pictured above), made its debut at the Asphodel-Norwood Community Centre (ANCC)!

### **RECREATION UPDATE**

The pandemic continued to impact operations at the ANCC but the ice plant opened on target, and the Township was thrilled to welcome back over 14 regular user groups. The centre hosted three hockey tournaments and reported successful summer seasons for Norwood Minor Ball and Adult Ball leagues. Welcomed two new positions to the team: Community Program Coordinator and Lead Hand for Parks, Recreation, and Facilities

Adopted a **5-year** Parks and Playgrounds Plan

Township staff maintained **40+** hanging basket locations throughout the village from May until Thanksgiving weekend

As identified in the recreation planning surveys, we heard you and welcomed the Boys and Girls Club (BGC) Kawarthas to the ANCC Park for summer programming. A total of **260** children participated in the 9-week program, the majority of which were local to Asphodel-Norwood. BGC Kawarthas intends to return in the summer of 2022 with enhanced programming

### SAFE COMMUNITY PROJECT ZERO


With support from Enbridge Gas and the Fire Marshal's Public Fire Safety Council, the Asphodel-Norwood Fire & Rescue Department received **114** combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms through Safe Community Project Zero in an effort to bring fire and carbon monoxide-related deaths down to zero.

When properly installed and maintained, combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms help provide the early warning needed to safely escape from a house fire or carbon monoxide exposure. During Carbon Monoxide Awareness Week (November 1-7), ANFR was able to install alarms for residents in need. Limited quantities remain available, please reach out for more information.

### Received \$82,491.54 in efficiency funding for extrication tools

Continued to allocate \$80,000 into reserves for replacement of pumper no. 2 at the Westwood fire station in 2025

Recognized retired Asphodel-Norwood Fire and Rescue members, who dedicated an accumulated **108 years** of service in the pursuit of ensuring safety and well-being of Township residents







well as a bonus prize bundle was awarded at the conclusion of the Shop Local Campaign.







### **2022 MUNICIPAL ELECTION**

Council approved telephone / internet voting only for the 2022 Municipal election to mirror the 2018 Municipal election process.

### LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Council adopted a Land Acknowledgement before Council meeting proceedings to respectfully acknowledge the treaty and traditional territory of the Michi Saagiig Anishinaabeg and offer gratitude to the First Peoples for their care of, and teachings about, our earth and our relations.

### VIRTUAL COUNCIL MEETINGS

At the outset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Council began conducting Council meetings virtually through Zoom.

These meetings were livestreamed via the Township's YouTube channel and posted to the Township website for members of the public to view at their convenience.

In 2021, Council met **34** times, received **165** staff reports, and the resultant videos were watched on YouTube **694** times.

### OCIF ANNOUNCEMENT

On December 8, 2021 Council and staff welcomed Premier Ford. Minister of Infrastructure, Kinga Surma, Minister of the Environment. Conservation and Parks. David Piccini, and Minister of Finance, Peter Bethlenfalvy to the Township for the announcement of Ontario's commitment to provide an additional \$1 billion over the next five years to help build and repair local roads, bridges, water and wastewater infrastructure in small. rural. and northern communities through the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund (OCIF).
